

It is with great pleasure I submit to you the Eaton Police Division's Annual Report for 2020. The Annual Report contains a variety of information, but I wanted to take this opportunity to inform of you of some of the highlights from 2020 not mentioned in the report.

- In January, Lt. Sizemore and Sergeant Mackey completed Incident Command 300 & 400 and K-9 Officers Jones and Pheanis attended Drug Interdiction training.
- In March, Aaron Melling was hired and joined our team as an Eaton Police Officer
- In July, Officer Wray and Officer Schmidt completed School Resource Officer basic training and joined the Ohio School Resource Officer Association.
- In September, Detective Huling, Officer Pheanis, Officer Rose, and Officer Eley attended the REID Interviews and Interrogations school. Officer Eley became a Standard Field Sobriety Instructor.
- In October, Officer Wray and Officer Schmidt became certified ALICE instructors.
- In November, Detective Tom Huling completed Detective Investigations school.
- In December, Officer Eley became a certified Taser instructor
- Our employee training program continued throughout the year and some of the training topics included Firearms training, Taser training, Pepper Spray training, Standard Field Sobriety, and Crisis Intervention Training.

The women and men of the Eaton Police Division worked hard to protect our community in 2020 and this report reflects their hard work and commitment to our community. We also want to recognize and thank City Council for the opportunities afforded to us and the support we receive that allows us to effectively serve the citizens of Eaton. 

Activity Levels


During 2020 there were 14,253 occurrences of public safety services. This includes citizen calls for Police, Fire, & EMS services as well as Police Officer self-initiated activity. The breakdown of the 14,253 occurrences is as follows:


- 11,918 were for Police services;
- 2,335 were for *Fire and/or EMS* services.

Of the 11,918 Police occurrences:


- 8,369 were citizen-initiated calls for service; an 15.7% decrease from 2019 (9,932).
- 3,549 were officer-initiated activity; a 6.3% decrease from 2019 (3,788).


The 11,918 police occurrences reflected a 13.1% **decrease** in total police activity. Citizen calls decreased by 15.7% and police reports increased by 31.5%; 2,415 reports were taken in 2020 compared to 1,836 in 2019.





Of the total public safety calls received in 2020, 877 were received as a 911 call. A decrease of 46% from last year's 1,625 911 calls.

Index Crimes


Index Crimes are those crimes which are considered violent crimes, crimes that affect the very fiber of society. Eaton continues to have a relatively low index crime rate. The strength (personnel and other resources) and the aggressiveness of the Eaton Police Division in conjunction with the support of the law abiding citizens of Eaton are key factors in keeping these levels low.

Crimes can be cleared by arrest, or with a disposition of "exception," which means when some element beyond the control of law enforcement precludes the filing of formal charges against a suspect. The arrest of one person may clear several crimes or several persons may be arrested in connection with a single incident. As indicated below, overall index crimes for 2020 decreased by 39.3% from 2019.

Arrests



Arrested persons often are charged with more than one crime and as a result the total charges filed will exceed the total number of people arrested.



In 2020 we received three officer complaints on three different officers that were document in our intelligence reporting system. All three complaints were investigated to completion and closed.







Traffic Stops/Violations

In 2020 Eaton Police Officers initiated 598 traffic stops and we received 0 bias based policing complaints. We handled 342 incidents where at least one (1) traffic citation was issued. The bottom line in the graph below represents the monthly breakdown of those incidents. Of those incidents, one or more citations may be issued. In 2020, 433 citations were filed from those 342 incidents. Each citation corresponds to a violation of City or State traffic laws. The light-colored line in the graph below represents the monthly break down of the citations filed by the Eaton Police Division in 2020. Most of the citations stemmed from 792 traffic stops and 229 motor vehicle crashes

Motor Vehicle Crashes

The **229** Motor Vehicle Crashes that occurred on City streets was a 22.4% **decrease** over last year's 299 crashes (these totals do not include private property crashes). The table below shows the monthly break down of crash reports handled and their totals. There were no fatal crashes in 2020.

Officer Eley attended REID Interviews and Interrogations school and took a prominent lead role in our Crisis Intervention program.



Investigation of the Year Award

The 2020 Investigation of the Year Award went to Detective Brian Carpenter for EPD case #2020-153. This case shows Detective Carpenter's hard work and is a great example of our Guiding Principles of Teamwork and Commitment to Excellence. This is the first homicide in Eaton since 2005. Detective Carpenter showed great teamwork by working with the Preble County Coroner's Office, the Preble County Prosecutors Office, Vancrest, OARRS, and with other EPD officers. Detective Carpenter conducted several follow-ups, obtained subpoenas, and multiple recordings throughout the course of this investigation. He also conducted multiple interviews and interrogations. Detective Carpenter was able to obtain a suspect confession in
